

RECISTRATION

The InConJunction registration table(s) will be open, for both pre-registration badge pickup and walk-in registrations, during the following hours:

Friday: 12 PM - 8 PM Saturday: 9 AM - 6 PM Sunday: 9 AM - 12 PM

Hang on to your badge at the convention! Lost badges can only be replaced with the purchase of a new registration.

CHILD SAFETY

InConJunction has always strived to be a family-friendly convention. We are happy that you have chosen to bring your family to spend the weekend with us. However, please note that even though we do provide a limited selection of family-oriented programming, we do not provide babysitting services. You are responsible for, and required to provide supervision of, any children you bring.

Children 12 and under must be accompanied by an adult at all times. Your child will not be admitted to convention programming alone. If your child is found unattended a second time, you will be contacted and asked to leave the convention. This policy is for your child's safety - we share this hotel with a number of people not with the convention, and there is easy access out of the hotel completely. We want you and your children to have a wonderful time at InConJunction, but that can only happen if everyone is safe.

GENERAL COSTUMING SUGGESTIONS

Many InConJunction attendees enjoy roaming the halls in unusual outfits throughout the weekend. The following suggestions are provided for costumers and others alike:

- 1. Please do not wear costumes which pose a hazard to yourself or others. Dressing up as The Human Torch, real flames and all, may be quite a nifty costume but you can only wear it once.
- 2. If you see a scantily clad individual (male, female or otherwise), do not assume that this gives you the right to proposition them. The convention, and hotel security, will enforce their rights to keep the weekend free of unwelcome advances.
- **3.** Please observe all laws regarding public appearance and behavior. Remember, "no costume" is still no costume. Our convention is open to all age groups, and Little Timmy or Auntie Bertha might get the wrong idea.
- **4.** Many costumes you see may be quite fascinating and wonderfully crafted. Please don't touch them without the permission of the wearer. Some costumes are very expensive and can be quite fragile. On a related note, please be sure

to ask permission before taking photographs. Most costumers love to have their pictures taken; just be polite.

2015 marks our sixth year back at the Marriott, with which we hope to continue our long and friendly relationship for many years to come. With this in mind, here are a couple of things we'd like everyone to remember:

- 1. Most hotel rules are fairly common-sense: don't put shampoo in the hot tub, don't bring glassware to the pool area, etc. Another to be aware of: animals are not permitted in the outdoor courtyard area (including the patios outside rooms).

 2. Please be polite to the staff they're working on a holiday weekend, after all. And be sure to tip appropriately, including to the folks who clean your room.

 3. All menu items at the Skylight Bistro & Wine Bar and the Skylight Java Café (located just off the hotel lobby) will be discounted by 10% during the entire weekend of the convention when you wear your badge. The breakfast buffet will be \$16.95 plus a 10% discount for anyone with a badge, and will feature a full omelet bar, waffle bar, etc.
- 4. Keep watch for signs stating when the hotel pool and hot tub will be open; in the past, the hotel has graciously extended their normal hours for InConJunction.
 5. Smoking is no longer allowed in the building or the courtyard by the fountain/pool. Those in patio rooms are allowed to smoke ONLY ON THE PATIO.
 6. As of 2015, the Indianapolis Marriott East will no longer allow pets (other than assisted living and guide animals) to stay in the hotel with their owners, but is provisionally allowing guests to bring their pets this year provided that the hotel was informed prior to June 20 and that the guest pays the \$30 refundable pet deposit. Failure to inform the hotel and/or pay the pet deposit could, and quite possibly will, result in the guest being asked to vacate the premises.

DISCUSIMER: THE PROGRAM BOOK COLLOR (IS NOT A TIME CORD

The vagaries of print mean that the program book you are holding was submitted to the printer two-and-a-half weeks before the convention. We make every effort to have our plans in place by then, but a lot can change in a couple of weeks: people get sick, plans change, mistakes are discovered and fixed, and so on. Thus, Expo Hall listings, donors and items in the Charity Auction, and scheduled times on our programming grid and in the dedicated stand-alone rooms are subject to change. Anyone you were looking forward to contacting but unable to will be listed on the archives of our website for many years after this convention. InConjunction HERRESEMENT POLICY

InConJunction is dedicated to providing a harassment-free convention experience for everyone. This policy applies to all participants, whether Convention Committee members, volunteers, vendors, invited guests or paying attendees.

Harassment includes images in public spaces, deliberate intimidation, stalking, following, harassing photography or recording, sustained disruption of talks or other events, inappropriate physical contact, unwelcome attention and offensive verbal comments related to, but not limited to:

- Religion
- Political affiliation
- Nation of origin
- Age
- Marital status
- Veteran status
- Gender

- Gender identity and expression
- Sexual orientation
- Disability
- Physical appearance
- Body size
- Race

People of all ages attend InConJunction. Sexual language and imagery can be a form of harassment, or can just be inappropriate in a particular setting. As a guideline for determining the appropriateness of such, InConJunction uses the PG-13 movie criteria.

Exceptions to the sexual language and imagery rule may be made for those events listed in the program book as "Adults Only," where participants are given ample warning and opportunity to leave beforehand, and only in cases when it is necessary to the topic of discussion and presented in a respectful manner.

If a participant engages in harassing behavior, the convention organizers may take any action they deem appropriate, including warning the offender or expulsion from the convention without refund.

If you are being harassed, notice that someone else is being harassed or have any other concerns, please contact a member of convention staff immediately. Convention staff will be happy to help participants contact hotel/venue security or local law enforcement, provide escorts or otherwise assist those experiencing harassment to feel safe for the duration of the convention. We value your attendance.

Dr. Arlan K. Andrews Sr.

Author Guest of Honor

Author, futurist and founder of the SIGMA science fiction think tank

"Science fiction is my way of life," Dr. Arlan Andrews says quite seriously. "It gave form to my childhood imagination, and those

visions have propelled me through my adult life." He credits SF for taking him out of the backwoods of Arkansas and into a lifetime of technology development. "Who knows, if I'd stayed home, I might have gotten into politics," says Arlan, who was indeed the Libertarian Party's nominee for governor of North Carolina in 1976. "But who would ever take any politician from Arkansas seriously?" (Like another Arkansan at the time, he did make it to the White House, serving as a Fellow in the White House Science Office in 1992-1993.)

Retiring in 2013 after a long career in engineering design and development from White Sands Missile Range to his own high-tech startups, Arlan is now a full-time writer, consultant, researcher and public speaker. His November 2014 Analog novella Flow is a recommended choice on both the "Sad Puppies" and "Rabid Puppies" slates for Hugo nominations, and a December 2014 short story, Foundation and Zombies, is available online from

StupefyingStories.com. His two e-publications; a novel, Valley of the Shaman; and a short story collection, Other Heads & Other Tales, are both available for Kindle and Nook.

An SF fan ever since reading Heinlein's Red Planet in 1950, and an SF pro since his first sales to Omni and Asimov's in 1979, he has since published over 500 SF stories, articles, columns, poems and novelty items in more than 100 venues worldwide, including Analog, SF Review, SF Age, Fantasy Book, Pulphouse, anthologies (Nanodreams, How to Save the World), UFO Magazine, The New Scientist, Journal of the British Interplanetary Society, Atlantis Rising and others. His nonfiction deals with everything from humor, politics, nanotech, 3D printing, alternative archeology and UFOs to various aspects of the esoteric and paranormal.

While working at the White House in 1992, Arlan founded SIGMA, a group of professional science fiction authors who provide pro bono futurism consulting for the federal government and appropriate nongovernmental organizations (NGOs). SIGMA has

since worked with the Department of Homeland Security, various military and intelligence agencies, and NGOs. In January 2012 four SIGMAns were guests of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia at the Global Competitiveness Forum in Riyadh, presenting a panel on "Disruptive Technologies." In May 2015, SIGMAns made presentations at the "Humans to Mars (H2M)" conference in Washington, D.C.

In the field of alternative archaeology, Arlan has published articles for the magazines Atlantis Rising and Ancient American, and wrote one of the forewords to InConJunction guest Chris Dunn's latest book, Lost Technologies of Ancient Egypt. Fulfulling a lifelong dream, he visited pyramids and temples in Egypt in 2008, accompanied by longtime friend and author Dunn. In 2012 he visited other ancient sites in Peru, and is now working on a book to share some of his discoveries there. He made brief appearances on the Ancient Aliens cable TV show "Ancient Engineers," and in the French documentary movie "Revelations of the Pyramids."

In 2013 Arlan retired as environmental director of Naval Air Station Corpus Christi, Texas. In 2015 he and his wife Joyce relocated to a suburb of Louisville, Ky., where they are looking forward to reconnecting with InConJunction and other Midwest fandom and old-time friends.



Timothy Zahn

Author Guest of Honor

Author of the Thrawn series of "Star Wars" books, the Quadrail series, the Conquerors Trilogy and the Cobra Rebellion Trilogy, Timothy Zahn was born in Chicago in 1951 and grew up in the western suburb of Lombard. He attended

Michigan State University in East Lansing, Mich., earning a B.S. in physics in 1973, and moved on to the University of Illinois Champaign-Urbana for graduate work. He earned a M.S. there, also in physics, in 1975, and continued work toward a doctorate. Also in 1975, he began a new hobby: writing science fiction. At first a strictly spare-time avocation, over the next three years he gradually gave more time to it until he sold his first story in December 1978 ("Ernie," Analog, September 1979). In 1980 he left grad school and began writing full-time.

Since then he has published 45 novels, over a hundred short stories and novelettes, and four collections of short fiction. Best known for his 10 "Star Wars" novels, he is also the author of the Quadrail series, the Cobra series, the Conquerors Trilogy and the young-adult Dragonback series. His latest books are Cobra Slave, the first book of the Cobra Rebellion Trilogy, and Star Wars: Scoundrels.

Upcoming books include Cobra Outlaw, the second Cobra Rebellion novel, Soulminder, and A Call to Duty, the first of the Manticore Ascendant collaborations with David Weber set in the Honor

Harrington universe.

Timothy's last appearance at InConJunction was during InConJunction's ninth year, way back in 1989. So, needless to say, we're thrilled to have him back and looking forward to catching up with what he's been up to in the last 25 years.

Music Guest of Honor


Acoustic Folk Funk Singer-Songwriter

Singer-songwriter Marian Call has released five albums since 2007, and her shows have been well-received in all 50 states and

all across Canada and Europe. Her sound is soulful, honest and clever, by turns humorous and heartbreaking. She sounds a little like the love child of Ingrid Michaelson and Regina Spektor, who was raised by Joni Mitchell and Ani DiFranco.

Marian has a passionate online following and the enthusiastic endorsement of a number of Web celebrities such as Felicia Day, Wil Wheaton, Paul F. Tompkins, NPR's Peter Sagal and Adam Savage of the Mythbusters. She has played on the Jonathan Coulton Cruise, has performed at the NerdMelt Theater at San Diego Comic-Con, and has toured with w00tstock and the Ladies of Ragnarok (The Doubleclicks and Molly Lewis), warming the hearts of comic shop denizens and convention-goers across the country.

RJ Haddy



Artist Guest of Honor

Former contestant and finalist on SyFy's "Face Off"

A native of Charleston, W.Va., it was obvious to everyone but RJ Haddy from a very early age that he would become known for the

extroverted yet down-to-earth and kind personality he exhibited on "Face Off." Due to the mesmerizing effect the visual imagery in the "Star Wars" saga had on him, RJ began making 3-D art projects in kindergarten and hasn't stopped yet. Combining his love of creation and performance, he naturally

gravitated to puppeteering.

After graduating from high school, RJ attended The Joe Blasco Makeup Artist Training Center in Hollywood and immediately began working for Alterian Studios Inc. under world-class effects artist Tony Gardner, where he had the ability to work on such big-budget box office movies as "Batman and Robin," "There's Something About Mary" and "Contact." This, plus a brief stint at ADI during the filming of "Bedazzled" and "6th Day,", allowed him to return home with the skill set to teach at his alma mater. For eight years, RJ taught at Capital High School in Charleston in the Department of Film, Television, and Multimedia Arts and Sciences, a department he single-handedly wrote and designed the curriculum for. He was living a content life as a teacher but yearned to get back into the professional circuit. Then "Face Off" premiered, and it became an event to watch Season 1 with the students at lunch (and during some classes). At the end of the first season, and pressured by a few of his upperclassmen, he submitted his audition packet. To his surprise, he was called to LA for an audition.

RJ went through Season 2 as a top contender, being in the bottom of the challenges only once, until the end when he locked down his spot as one of the three finalists. RJ didn't win the judges' vote and the cash prize but did win "audience favorite," which has meant the world to him, and he wants to thank every fan of the show that voted for him. RJ returned for Season 5 as one of eight veterans competing against eight rookies. He was eliminated in Episode 5. He left teaching to work full-time as a special-effects artist while running an e-commerce site selling airbrush equipment, including his own Shadow Line of brushes. He is also working on getting financing for a film and Web-based reality series.

And in 2014 RJ returned for the Syfy special series

"Foxy & Company."

Be on the lookout for his new feature film "The Night Watchmen," which RJ just finished leading the makeup department for.

Barry Childs-Helton - along with wife Sally - has

been a musical presence in filk rooms and on convention concert stages around the Midwest and beyond since 1985. Barry and Sally have been musical guests at InConJunction with filk-rockers Black Book Band (whose live CD is "First Contact" from Dodeka Records) and with the eclectic-Celtic band Wild Mercy (three CDs on the Small Green Alien label, now at work on a fourth, "Rising Road"). Barry has led closing jam sessions at various cons; with Sally, he was inducted into the Filk Hall of Fame in 2003. His new solo CD is a collection of original songs, "The Summers Behind You" from Dragon Scale Records.

Sally Childs-Helton, Ph. D.

Drummer with the Celtic/filk band Wild Mercy; an ethnomusicologist and archivist, she is mostly harmless

Sally Childs-Helton and her husband Barry have been active in fandom since 1983 as filkers performing as a duo and also with the Black Book Band, and with Wild Mercy since 2002. Sally is an ethnomusicologist, percussionist, music educator and archivist. She teaches guided music improvisation and facilitates drumming activities, as well as conducting two annual women's drumming retreats (www.womendrum.org), and accompanies choruses, theater and dance. When not making music, Sally is a voracious reader of SF, especially hard SF and cyberpunk. She and Barry live in Indianapolis, where they cater to a Jack Russell and a Shiba Inu/German Shepherd mix.

Mark Dooley

Featured Guest "De Boss" of the Whoosier Network

Mark C. Dooley is "De Boss" of the Whoosier Network, Indiana's Doctor Who and sci-fi connection. An award-winning artist, writer, journalist, stand-up comic, documentarian and panel moderator, he currently poses as "The 13th Doctor," and should the actual 13th show up he'll move in rank as the 14th, and so on and so forth. That way he's always at least a step ahead of all the others.

TammyJo Eckhart

TammyJo Eckhart is the author of 11 books and a regular at InConJunction. She has been published

Michelle Mussoni, also known in the cosplay world as Mogchelle, started in the costume world by just being an average geek attending a Japanese Animation convention in 1999. Seeing all the other people in costumes around looked like a fun time, like it was Halloween all over again. Her love for the artwork in anime, video games and comic books made her want to bring the 2D images from the pages and screen to real life. She's also been featured in several national and international magazines, and interviewed by online entertainment news sources for her costume work.

Over the years she has won countless awards for both craftsmanship and performance, starting as a novice and working her way up to the master level of competition as of 2003. In 2010 she had the honor of winning a chance at the Yume Cup at Anime Central, and was shipped off to New York City as the Midwest representative in a nationwide cosplay competition along with the very talented Alena VanArendonk from "And Sewing is Half the Battle!" to compete for the national prize. In 2012, she reached international award status by competing at the World Science Fiction Convention, where two awards were won: best re-creation and a special Golden Quill award for a custom set of angel wings. Every year she challenges herself to new techniques in the costuming and makeup world, and has created several of her own techniques as well - some of which have made trained costumers and prop makers cringe, but then smile when they see that it worked. Conventions across the country often ask Michelle to present a panel or workshop on how she does what she does. Those workshops vary from lightweight armor creation, molding and casting to wig design, wings or character portrayals, with more being added every year, all in the effort to spread her love for DIY costumes for the average person who can't shell out thousands of dollars for wearable art.

She is open to a few slots every year for commissions to the public. She has done work for The Children's

Museum of Indianapolis, Manga/Starz Entertainment, Studio Ironcat LLC and several other video game, comic book, and anime publishers across the country. Also for 2015, she's adopted a nonprofit organization to help fundraise for. For all of 2015 25% of all print, accessories and worbla profits are being given to Together We Rise! They're an amazing organization that works hard to help improve lives for children in the foster system in America.

Mad Scientist and Pseudo Super Villain

Rocketed to Earth as an infant to escape the destruction of his home world where his parents had been brutally murdered before his eyes one night in a dark alley, Rob's ship crash-landed in a jungle where he was adopted by a friendly gorilla and raised to learn the ways of the jungle. As a teenager, Rob re-joined society and quickly enlisted in the Army, where he was given an experimental formula designed to create the ultimate soldier. SILENT CUSTIONS

BIDDING

All write-in bidding ends at 5 p.m. on Saturday. There is no voice auction. The last bid on the sheet at 5 p.m. wins!

Study the information on the Bid Sheet carefully, as it includes information such as whether a piece is original or a print, the print number if it is a print, and the medium used to create the piece, as well as the artist's name and the title of the piece.

If you want to buy a piece outright for the Quick Sale price, inform the Art Show staff, who will process the sale. Works cannot be sold at the Quick Sale price if they already have bids.

If you wish to bid on a piece, PRINT your bid, name and badge number on the Bid Sheet of the piece you desire to buy. Your bid must be equal to or higher than the Minimum Bid price.

Bids must be in even-dollar increments.

Do not remove bids from the Bid Sheets. If you have made a mistake, see the Art Show staff, who will rectify the situation. Bids removed by anyone other than the Art Show staff are still valid and will still be counted!

Your bid is a contract. You are agreeing to pay the amount of your bid.

PURCHASTING

Art must be paid for and picked up by 3 p.m. on Sunday. All works that are unpaid will be returned to the artist.

Pieces not sold at the end of the auction on Saturday may only be purchased at the Sunday Price. If there is no Sunday Price listed, the piece cannot be sold.

A few pieces are displayed as "Not For Sale" or "NSF" (this is fairly common with Guests of Honor). This does in fact mean that we cannot sell the piece. If you are interested in purchasing the piece, you will need to contact the artist directly.

THE PRINT SHOP

In addition to the items for auction, the InConJunction Art Show also has a Print Shop to sell more mass-produced artwork. The prices are marked on the items. If you wish to purchase an item in the Print Shop, simply bring it to the cash register, pay and take it with you!

For copyright reasons, photography is not allowed in the Art Show. People entering the Art Show will be asked to check their bags, cameras and devices with cameras. While we are certain that 99.9% of those who enter the Art Show are honest people who would never dream of stealing artwork, this measure is in place for those few bad apples that occur in any population. The exception: television news cameras for purposes of advertising the show and convention. We thank you for your understanding.
